



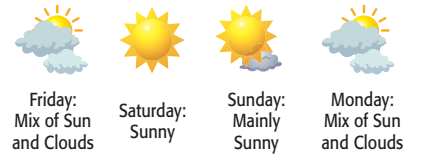

# Tottenham branch of NTPL celebrates grand opening

It has been over a year since the Pam Kirkpatrick branch of the New Tecumseth Public Library first opened its doors at the new location at the Tottenham Community Centre, however the official grand opening was held on Thursday, June 30, 2022.

When the pandemic hit, the library had to put its grand opening on hold to comply with public safety measures and not have events with a crowd.

The branch was relocated after approximately 11 years at its temporary location at the Tottenham Mall.

That location was chosen after the previous building on Queen Street was deemed hazardous and not fit for a public venue.

Visitors to the new branch are greeted by a large open space with plenty of windows to let the light shine in. The branch also has some unique new features to assist patrons as well as provide some exciting new activities.

“During the pandemic, depending on what the rules were at the time, if we had to keep the doors closed we would still do curbside service for patrons,” explained Jessica Mole, New Tecumseth Public Library CEO, of maintaining service during the pandemic. “They could put things on hold, by either calling or through our on-line catalogue. We would put it together and bring it to the door for them. Once the rules changed, we could offer more than curbside and we had the computers open. We let people browse. One of the main advantages at the new branch is we have more space, both inside and outside, and the fact that we are connected right to the community centre.”

One new feature at the new branch which is becoming quite the success is the “maker space.”

This is a room at the library which features 3-d printers, a laser vinyl cutter, and other craft making tools.

The room was made possible by the Tottenham Community Recreation Improvement Committee (CRIC)

The branch has been open to the public for over a year, however the official opening was delayed due to the pandemic. There are many new features at the branch, including the CRIC Idea Lab which has a ‘maker space’ available for patrons and groups.

which holds annual fundraisers in the town for local projects.

“The big thing is the CRIC Idea Lab, which is a ‘maker space,’ Ms. Mole explained. “A lot of libraries and schools now have one – it’s for anyone to come in and try different skills on many different machines.

We have a special printer that cuts very precisely, you can cut vinyl with it and iron it on a shirt. We have two 3D printers. Our biggest thing is the laser cutter. CRIC gave us a very good donation for this.”

The new branch location has become a hub for activity in the community.

## Brock's Banter: A return to the sea of red and white

By any measure of the sea of red and white before us, it was a remarkable return to form for Canada Day.

After more than two years of not being able to gather as we have always in the past, the arrival of what has been an elusive sense of normalcy was both palpable and comforting.

We were able to meet up and spend quality time with family and friends, take in some of the family-friendly programs our communities had to offer, all capped with dazzling fireworks displays.

Event planning of any kind has been fraught for the last two-and-a-half years.

Once a plan was finalized, it was a crap shoot whether the very next day new public health rules would be handed down by the Province, making months and months of preparation all for naught.

When things got a bit better, long-gestating plans would not have to be fully scrapped but retooled and rethought as gathering numbers were tweaked, expanded or contracted.

Then again, if all the hard work going into such events was able to stay in place, there was the ultimate question of whether or not the public would be ready to come out of their self-imposed bubbles and celebrate with their neighbours again.

Maybe that wasn't the ultimate question; for many people across Canada there was also the question of just what we would be celebrating come Canada Day.

The global pandemic upended our world, even in ways we couldn't begin to fathom before March of 2000. As we had more time in those early days away from whatever rat race we ran in between statutory holidays, it gave us, for better or worse, more time to focus on the issues of the day and what really mattered to us.

For many, it was an enlightening experience as the luxury of time afforded us the opportunity to, perhaps, try to put ourselves into the shoes of others and see the world from their perspective, one that was undoubtedly very different from our own.

But, in some respects, the inability to go about our regular routine created different pressures, some of which spilled over in ways they hadn't previously when we witnessed injustice to others or even the bristle of what we've come to know as our freedoms temporarily limited by obvious circumstances.

Injustices that had been sadly occurring and reoccurring for decades came into sharp new focus, as did the level of energy to go out, health restrictions be damned, and do

something about it for your fellow human.

Conversely, what would have in eras past been seen as making a small sacrifice for the greater good was apparently too much to ask for as so many looked narrowly at a very broad-based issue in terms of how it might affect them and only them.

Things that were once safe ground for apolitical discussion turned out to be fraught with politically-charged pitfalls and the most innocuous-seeming circumstances turned out to be anything but, depending on where you were or who you were talking to.

As such, as we returned to a fully-fledged, restriction free, almost-normal-in-a-new-normal Canada Day, I was slightly trepidatious on what to expect on the day itself.

Don't get me wrong, I knew our communities would rise to the occasion and both celebrate what's great about Canada and contemplate some of the not-so-great aspects of where we are with a constructive eye to where we're going – but it was anyone's guess at how the celebration would unfold as a whole across the country.

Thankfully, from this observational standpoint, it was more or less smooth sailing as revellers settled into the festivities.

From my personal perspective, a part in fostering a feeling of celebration and unity were the words of our Governor General Mary Simon.

As this country grapples with fully understanding and appreciating the terrible history of Indigenous-settler relations, I found it heartening to see the first Indigenous person to hold the office of Governor General deliver such a unifying and calming message to all Canadians – without the political baggage that comes with being the leader of a government or party, serving or aspiring.

“Let me begin by thanking Canadians for their efforts during the pandemic,” she said. “Thank you, Canada, for all your efforts during the pandemic, particularly the frontline workers who made a difference. They're a big part of the reason we can once again be out in the world and I applaud their work. I am delighted that we can once again see friends and family and show love for our country.

“As a country, we must remember that the spirit of celebration doesn't extend to everyone. This day may also be a reminder of what we have lost. Of course, we suffered tragic losses during the pandemic, and increasingly from climate disasters. And I've met with Indigenous peoples who continue to show strength and resilience but still grieve lost culture, languages and lives. This pain is renewed as they uncover locations of unmarked graves at residential schools. We must all work to-

gether to walk the road of reconciliation. It begins with understanding and respect.

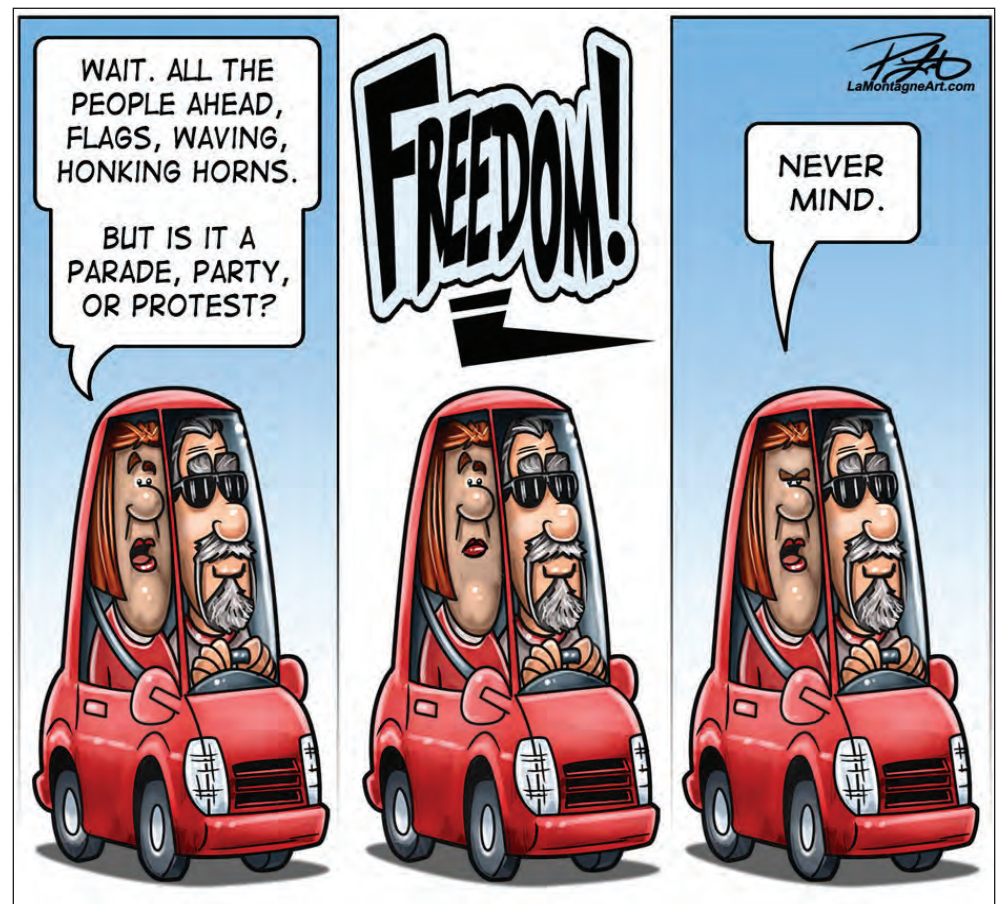
“You may have heard me speak of ‘ajuinata’ in the past year. It's a phrase in Inuktitut and important to Inuit. It means to never give up, to commit yourselves to action. The spirit of ajuinnata surrounds us. It's in the perseverance shown during the pandemic. In the tireless work in communities across Canada. And in the determination and hope of our youth to work toward building a Canada that lives up to our dreams.

“As we celebrate Canada Day, I want to encourage people in the same spirit to continue building an inclusive society, one where we can be who we are without judge-

ment, where everyone belongs. Lead with kindness and compassion.”

By leading with those two core attributes, we just might be able to rediscover common ground that has become somewhat eroded over the past two-and-a-half years. Kindness and compassion, along with ajuinnata, will help us continue building the kind of country that we want, the one we've always aspired to be, and the one we've often told ourselves has been here all along.

Congratulations to all those behind the events that so aptly celebrated our country with a thoughtful and considered balance, as well as to all those who took part. It was nice to be back!

# Lake Simcoe Regional Airport lands new aircraft maintenance operator

A new company at the Lake Simcoe Regional Airport will help provide many new services at the airport.

The addition of Chartright Air Group as a fixed base operator (FBO) enables the Airport to offer a full suite of passenger and aircraft handling services, including baggage handling, on-site customs, complete line service, aircraft cleaning, fueling, de-icing, hangarage, aircraft parking, catering, hotel, and car rental coordination.

Chartright will operate a full-service aircraft maintenance organization with a focus on turbine/jet aircraft. It is anticipated that a full-service FBO, notably one of Canada's largest operators of private jet aircraft, will act as a catalyst for future investment at the airport.

Chartright's 34,000 square-foot FBO and hangar facility at the airport features a generous lobby, passenger and crew lounges, pilot snooze rooms, a meeting room, and a weather and flight planning facilities, which is able to accommodate aircraft up to the size of the Global 7500.

Lake Simcoe Regional Airport is situated between Barrie and Orillia in the Township of Oro-Medonte. The airport is among the newest regional airport facilities in Canada.

The County of Simcoe, along with minority shareholder the City of Barrie, continue a planned investment of more than \$60 million into service and infrastructure enhancements at the Airport.

Once completed, those investments will provide critical connectivity to markets and knowledge-based resources to encourage investment, create new opportunities for local businesses and tourism operators.

"Lake Simcoe Regional Airport is one of Canada's newest and best-positioned regional airport facilities and will enable Chartright to better serve the needs of our customers and the aviation community," said Adam Keller, president of Chartright Air Group. "We look forward to welcoming customers to our new facility at Lake Simcoe Regional Airport."

The Lake Simcoe Regional Airport is fully serviced by the Canada Border Services Agency and accommodates both international passengers and freight.

# New organization wants to get seniors involved in climate change action

A new organization in the region hopes to get seniors actively involved in climate change by making them more aware of this threat to the environment and helping them to reduce their carbon footprint by making simple adjustments in their everyday lifestyle, routines, and decisions.

Called, Greys for Green, the organization's tag line is "Seniors for Climate Change, Awareness, Advocacy, and Action."

Organization President and Founder Kelly Pearce said he came up with the idea after retiring and wanting to still contribute to the community and society through his retirement years.

Mr. Pearce lives in the Briar Hill retirement community and through discussions, many of which took place on the golf course, with other residents, re-

alized there was enough interest among residents to start an organization geared towards seniors in the area.

"I thought that when I retired, as a senior, I would have more time on my hands to do something for the environment, which I've always been concerned about," Mr. Pearce explained. "I moved into a retirement community here in Alliston. I'm a golfer, and we have a golf course here, and I meet a lot of other retired folks here. I got the idea that they were from all walks of life, and I thought maybe this was the place to start this organization. There was a bunch of them that were interested in this cause. We wanted to create an environment where seniors could get involved and start giving back to the earth. This would be a legacy for their children and grandchildren."

A board of directors was created and plan put into place to start a pro-

gram. The other board members are Louise Montague, Vice-President/Acting Secretary, John Wilson-Treasurer, Jorma Ikavalko, Brian Howieson and Cassandra Dass-Pearce.

Many seniors are not fully aware of the impact of climate change causes and impacts, and the group hopes to provide information about it, and how seniors can help.

"Some people are actually very concerned about it but don't know what to do, so we wanted to give them the information about how to reduce their carbon footprint and make them more informed and more comfortable with the whole crisis" Mr. Pearce explained.

The group has opened the organization to include seniors from the whole

community including Alliston, Tottenham, and Beeton.

The organization is planning an official launch in September to let people know what they are all about and learn more about climate change action and what they can do to help.

The launch will take place at the Gibson Centre in Alliston on Tuesday, September 20, from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. While the event is geared towards seniors, all are welcome to attend this free event.

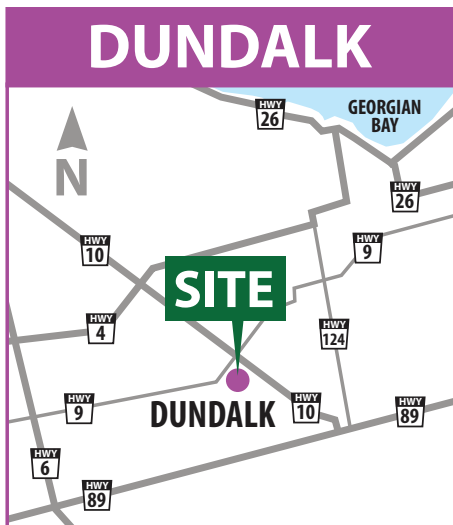

## Police warn public on “Fraud Department” scams

The Nottawasaga Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is warning members of the public to be vigilant when receiving phone calls or emails from alleged fraud departments stating suspicious activity on banking accounts.

Police are hoping that informing the public will help reduce further scams.

What’s been happening and what you should be aware of:

- Phone call from someone pretending to work for a banking institution
- Tells you that your bank accounts are at risk and money needs to be secured in a Bitcoin account
- Provides an address for you to deposit funds into a Bitcoin machine
- Requests you attend your banking institution to withdraw funds
- Requests you to purchase prepaid gift cards and asking you to provide the gift card numbers
- Often times, there will be a request not to tell anyone, to keep it a secret to avoid further trouble

### How to protect yourself:

- If something doesn’t seem right hang up
- Call your local police service and meet with an officer
- Make a follow up call to the actual banking institution to confirm information

### PROPERTY DEATH VICTIM IDENTIFIED

Members of the Caledon OPP are assisting with a death investigation at a commercial property in the Town of Caledon.

“On June 30, 2022, at approximately 3:20 p.m., Caledon OPP responded to a report of an unresponsive male at a commercial property on Airport Road, near King Street, in the Town of Caledon,” say Police. “The initial investigation revealed that a male was trapped under a garage bay door. The male was pronounced deceased at the scene.”

The deceased has been identified as Pasquale Salerno, 85, of Caledon.

The Ontario Ministry of Labour (MOL) and the Federal Department of Labour were notified and are investigating. The Office of the Chief Coroner for Ontario and OPP Forensic Identification Unit (FIS) are assisting with the investigation.

### DEADLY CANADA DAY HOUSE FIRE IN CALEDON

Members of the Caledon OPP remain on scene at a house fire that occurred on Canada Day that claimed the life of two victims.

“On July 1, 2022, at approximately 6:40 a.m., Caledon OPP, along with Caledon Fire, attended a house fire on Mountainview Road near Highway 9, in the Town of Caledon,” say Police. “When emergency crews arrived, the residence was found to be fully engulfed in flames. Nearby residents were evacuated with two people unaccounted for. The Office of the Ontario Fire Marshal was contracted and attended the scene. Two victims were later recovered.

“The names of the deceased have not yet been released as identities have yet to be confirmed and to allow for family notifications.”

### POLICE WARN AGAINST AGRICULTURAL TRESPASSING

The Dufferin Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is noticing an increase in agricultural trespassing in Dufferin County, culminating in a serious instance being shared on social media.

“On the Canada [Day] Long Weekend there were two occurrences of people stopping on the side of Highway 10 in Melancthon Township and entering a Canola field to take photos,” say Police. “While Canola is beautiful at this time of year, it is a crop. It is a large part of plant-based diets and a source of income for our farmers. The potential damage to this crop is valued at \$2,000 if only one acre is damaged. It will increase if there was a larger area affected.

“Fields containing crops are not required to have fences or signage to deter people from entering, as stated in the Trespass to Property Act. Therefore, entering a field, whether it is on foot or with an off-road vehicle, is trespassing. If a person damages crops, then a criminal charge of Mischief could be considered by a responding police officer.

“While Dufferin OPP will be monitoring for these situations, we do need public assistance. The situation that happened this past weekend was captured by photo, but a timely phone call to the police was not made. Dufferin OPP asks that if you see this happening, please call 1-888-310-1122 and report it immediately.”

The teacher was astonished to see that quite a few of the kids in her class did not want to, or could not, seem to form a conversation and instead were more focused when they had a device of some sort in front of their eyes.

Cell phones are great devices. You can contact someone from anywhere or pull up information at the drop of a hat. You can map your destination and receive directions when on the road, and you can order a coffee at Tim Hortons which will be ready for you when you get there.

At the same time these phones are becoming a menace to society.

There was a great photograph going around online of a subway car in Japan, posted by a guy who lived there, with a funny caption attached.

Every single person on that subway car was looking at a phone - every one.

If you get caught driving while using your phone, you’re going to pay a hefty fine – and with good reason. If you are using your phone you are distracted from the task of driving, which can have fatal consequences.

Phones have become the great distraction in society. If you are on the phone, you are distracted from everything else around you, and that includes people.

A while ago I was seated in a local wing joint, waiting for my order to arrive.

A family of four entered and were seated beside me. The father entered the restaurant looking at his phone. He didn’t put that phone down once, the entire time they were there.

While the mother fussed with the two young boys, helping them with their dinner, the father looked at his phone – even when the meal arrived.

He ate the meal with one hand while his other hand manipulated the phone. He didn’t say one word the entire time.

I felt like yelling out, “put down the phone and interact with your family!”

I’ve seen couples enter a donut shop, order a coffee, then both pull out their phones and spend the next 20 minutes looking at the phone while saying nothing to the person they are with.

I think if I sat down with a person to have a coffee with and they pulled out a phone instead of engaging in conversation, I would most likely say, “Well, have a nice night,” get up and leave.

There are people that walk through a busy intersection while looking at their phone and are totally oblivious to what is happening around them.

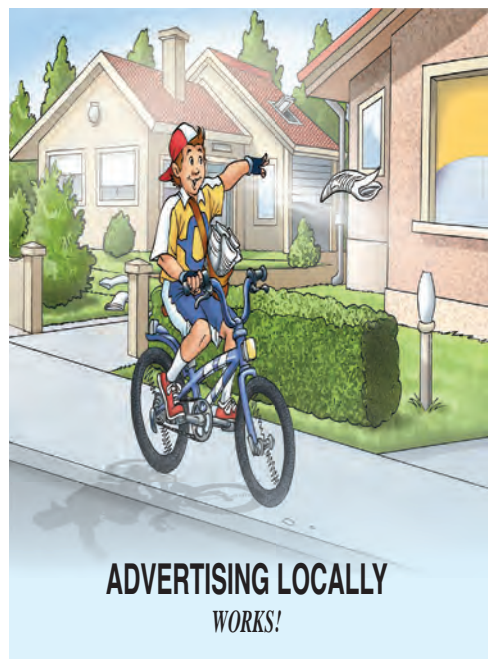

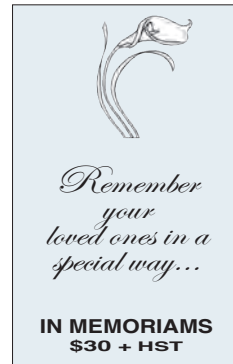

# Business owner fined for illegal dumping

If you try to dump your garbage illegally, you could be caught and given a hefty fine as one local business found out after appearing in court on June 21.

A complaint was made to New Tecumseth Municipal Law Enforcement in April 2021, about dumping of refuse and debris at a commercial plaza.

New Tecumseth Municipal Law Enforcement, in collaboration with the Nottawasaga OPP, investigated the com-

plaint and spoke to witnesses.

Following an investigation, owners of a business were issued two Part 3 charges which could have seen up to \$5,000 in fines per count.

The case was heard in the Ontario Court of Justice on June 21, 2022, which led to a conviction and fines against the business, in the amount of \$5,000 plus victim surcharges and court costs.

Municipal Law Enforcement is reminding everyone that it is important to work together to help stop dumping and littering in the com-

munity.

It should be noted that if an infraction is recorded on home security systems, that type of footage that shows violations is extremely helpful in collecting evidence that is need for convictions.

Anyone who observes dumping violations in the community is strongly encouraged to call the Town of New Tecumseth's Municipal Law Enforcement at 705-435-3900 to ensure violations are tracked and dealt with accordingly.
