New Tottenham elementary school to open for 2026-27 school year

A new school in Tottenham is scheduled to open for the 2026-27 school year.

Our Lady of Peace Catholic Elementary School is one of 35 new and expanded schools opening across Ontario this fall.

The Ontario government is investing \$30 billion over its 10-year plan to build, expand, and renew schools across the province.

Brian Sauderson, MPP for Simcoe-Grey, announced that the province provided the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board with \$28.2 million to build the new school in Tottenham.

This project will provide 516 elementary school spaces and 49 licensed child care spaces for local families for the 2026-27 school year.

“This new Our Lady of Peace Catholic Elementary School is a significant investment in students and families in Tottenham,” said MPP Sauderson. “We’re making sure students have modern, high-quality learning environments, and I’m excited to see this new school welcome students later this fall.”

For the 2026-27 school year, Ontario is providing record education funding of \$30.6 billion while making changes to strengthen student achievement and deliver more consistent learning experiences across the province.

Students and teachers will return to an updated curriculum, new classroom resources and stronger supports, including new tools to support financial literacy and math, direct funding for elementary homeroom teachers to purchase classroom supplies, and clearer expectations around attendance and assessment.

“As students head back to school, our focus is on giving every student the opportunity to

succeed,” said Paul Calandra, Minister of Education. “That means giving teachers the tools and resources they need, investing in modern schools, and making sure every dollar we invest in education is driving stronger student achievement.”

The school is located on Martin Trail in Tottenham.

“A great community starts with opportunities for young people to learn, grow, and

thrive,” said Mayor Richard Norcross. “Our Lady of Peace Catholic Elementary School represents more than a new building, it is an investment in our children, our families, and the long-term success of New Tecumseth. On behalf of council, I want to thank the Province of Ontario and the Simcoe Muskoka Catholic District School Board for supporting our students and helping build a strong foundation for future generations.”

County of Simcoe invests in Barrie property to strengthen homelessness support

The Busby Centre’s current services and support will continue to operate at 88 Mulcaster Street.

Through planned renovations and improvements, the county will transform the site into a modern and dynamic facility designed to support the evolving needs of individuals experiencing homelessness and housing instability.

Once complete, the revitalized site will offer housing-based programming alongside a range of wraparound support and services. This will help individuals access resources they need as they move toward safe, stable, and permanent housing.

The investment is part of the county’s 10-point Homelessness Prevention Strategy goals to improve and enhance the region’s available shelter services, strengthen support for individuals experiencing homelessness, and create innovative housing solutions.

By investing in this site and its relationship with the Busby Centre, the County of Simcoe is building a stronger continuum of care that meets people where they are and supports their path toward long-term housing stability.

The redevelopment of the properties will

build on numerous investments the County of Simcoe has made to enhance its multi-faceted system and support organizations like the Busby Centre to better support individuals experiencing homelessness. By creating a purpose-built environment designed to deliver comprehensive, client-centred supports, the project will reimagine service delivery and strengthen sustainable pathways out of homelessness.

Together, they are working to create a space that promotes dignity, stability, and opportunity for individuals seeking to rebuild their lives.

Conservative leader Pierre Poilievre visits Beeton on whistle-stop tour

Federal Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre visited two locations as part of a whistle-stop tour across the region on Thursday, Aug. 20.

The MP visited Borden Metal Products on Dayfoot St. and toured the facility while speaking with staff employed there.

He then went to the soon-to-be-opened Chantler Centre on 10th Sideroad and learned about the facility while speaking to staff and touring the former elementary school, which is being transformed into a centre to support children and families living with autism in Simcoe County.

Mr. Poilievre toured the entire facility and learned how it will benefit local children. He asked many questions and complimented staff on how they are preparing the facility to welcome children.

After the tour, he took the time to speak with a members of a local union who had come to see him, as well as members of the

media, who were given the opportunity to speak to the Conservative leader and ask questions.

When asked what the most important challenge the nation is currently facing, Mr. Poilievre replied, "The cost of living."

"No question – people can't afford to live in Canada anymore," Poilievre said. "Young people can't afford homes, families can't afford groceries, it costs \$100 to fill up at the pump – it's just not affordable."

He continued, "I just met [a person] at our last stop, and he said 'I work overtime, and by the time they tax my overtime, I take the money home and try to buy groceries, pay for my lodging and gas, I have nothing left.'"

Poilievre said the increase in fuel prices is making other items spike in price because of transportation costs.

"First of all, we should get rid of all taxes on fuel until at least Canada Day," he said.

"That would save you 25 cents a litre, \$20 per fill up, and around \$1,000 per family in direct fuel costs between now and July 1, 2027. It

would also lower the cost for our farmers and truckers who bring us our food, and would lower the costs of fertilizer and other inputs that go into the food chain."

Poilievre went on to visit Spectra Aluminum Products in Bradford before continuing to the Gretzky Pickleball Club in Hamilton to complete his day.

doctors Filipe and Beverly Tiburcio in support of the hospital's redevelopment.

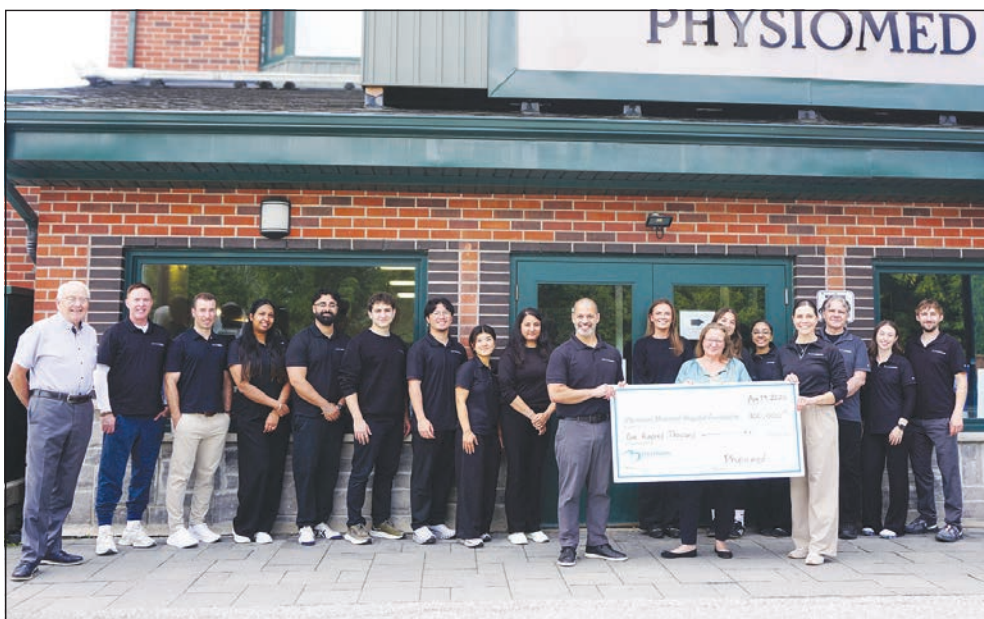
This significant commitment reflects their belief in the importance of investing in the future of healthcare for Alliston and the sur-

It's easy - You just make an 'x'

There's a municipal election coming up in two months.

This is your chance to stay home on election day, then complain about what your local government is doing for the next four years, after not voting against the person you didn't want to be elected, and not bothering to see which candidate might have best represented what you think should happen where you live.

It's a chance to complain about the roads, the local parks, and where your tax dollars are being spent without ever bothering to learn why the municipality is spending money on some projects while ignoring the fact that your neighbour's hedge is six inches taller than the by-law allows.

It gives you the opportunity to complain about the way the municipality is run without learning the name of the person representing your neighbourhood.

During the last municipal elections in 2022, the average voter turnout across the province was 36 per cent. In some municipalities, that figure dropped to between 25 and 29 per cent.

That's a dismal voter turnout.

Several years ago, there was a lot

of concern about a local municipality spending money on a rather large project. Quite a few people were against it, citing other areas where they felt the money should be spent.

There were some half-hearted protests demanding the municipal council change its mind about spending money on the project.

As part of a story I was doing on the whole situation, I put a list of questions in place to ask the protesters. The questions were indirect, but still requested some information about what protesters thought of the project and why they were against it.

All of the people I spoke to were calm and rational, and very nice.

However, there was a 'tell', that was very apparent when I spoke to people. Some of the questions were very straightforward, and would normally have a quick reply.

A person who hesitated, or suddenly got quiet, pretty much gave up the fact that they didn't bother to vote in the last election.

I didn't question this, or ask them why they didn't vote. It's not my business to question their choice to participate or not participate in the election process.

However, it was interesting to note how many people who now wanted to be heard had not bothered to mark an 'x' on a ballot during an election.

Most countries in the world don't really have a transparent voting process – even those which claim to have a democratic vote. We do, and yet almost 70 per cent of the population doesn't even cast a ballot.

It was only a couple of hundred years ago that Ontario didn't have a voting process and the province was run by appointed bureaucrats who made sure their fortunes were taken care of before the regular citizens even had a say in how the province was run.

The 1837 Rebellion was the common citizen's way of saying they didn't like the way the province was being managed.

They were a group of only around 900 individuals who marched on Toronto in a show of bravado, carrying some muskets, pitchforks, and other farm implements as weapons.

They were farmers, not soldiers, so the initial contact with a well-trained militia group didn't go well. In fact, some of the rebellion leaders later ended up swinging at the end of a rope

It wasn't much of a rebellion as uprisings go, but it was enough to make those in power realize that change was necessary.

It takes a lot of courage to throw your hat in the ring and run for public office. Everyone who does sign up to be a part of the process and seek to be elected should be thanked for being a part of the process.

And yet, the majority of citizens in the province won't exercise their right to cast a ballot.

It's not a hard process. You make a decision on who you would like to represent you.

The drive to the polling station takes two minutes. You walk inside, mark an 'x' next to the name of the person you would like to see elected, then you go home, take your place on the Lazy Boy chair and watch a re-run of your favourite television show.

It's simple.

Go ahead and give it a try in October.

At the very least, you can tell your children you did your civic duty and took part in the process that determines the future of where you live.

Ripping off the Band-Aid

If you were struggling to find your get-up-and-go over the first few days of this week, I'm sure you're not alone. It was, of course, an eventful weekend for all of us as trade talks with the United States, such as they were, collapsed, with our negotiating team apparently deciding that no deal was better than a bad deal.

According to both parties, negotiations were going well into last week, a last-minute extension of the tariff deadline being granted, apparently just to fine-tune some of the details.

By the time Friday arrived, however, it became clear that the devil would truly be in the details.

Midday passed without any real movement towards signatures being announced. Nothing further by the time the stock markets closed that afternoon. By the time dinner rolled around, no matter how diligently both sides claimed to be working, my optimism began to wane.

Surely if there was something positive to report, no matter how small a movement in the right direction, it would

have been heralded by both sides.

It was clear a long night lay ahead.

No matter how much I prepared to be in it for the long haul, an exceedingly busy workweek got the better of me, and, no matter how restless I was feeling about what lay ahead, I drifted off and woke up – still on the couch – to the news so many were dreading.

This sense of uncertainty is reflected in new data released Tuesday morning by the Angus Reid Institute which polled Canadians in the immediate aftermath of the trade deal collapse.

The poll found one-in-five Canadians expressed "frustration or anger after a year-and-a-half of tariffs, while anxiety, fear, and uncertainty (12 per cent), and disappointment (7 per cent) are also common."

The poll of 1,700 Canadians were asked to describe how they were feeling after these difficult 18 months and "frustration" and "anger" came out on top with 19 per cent of respondents; "anxiety", "worry", and "fear" following at 8 per cent; "disappointment" at 7 per

cent, "pride" and "patriotism" at 5 per cent; "uncertainty" and "confusion" at 4 per cent, "anti-US" and "Anti-Trump sentiment" at 3 per cent, "exhaustion" and "fatigue" at 3 per cent; "disgust" at 2 per cent; "betrayal" and "distrust" at 2 per cent; and rounding out the list with one per cent each were "indifference", "apathy", "disbelief," and "shock."

"The data also shows Canadians across the country are preaching national unity over Provincial interest at a majority level," the poll found. "Seven-in-10 (69 per cent) Canadians want a 'Team Canada' approach from their province; majorities in every province agree, ranging from 57 per cent in Saskatchewan to 75 per cent in Manitoba.

"This, despite elevated concern from Canadians that this trade dispute will hurt their province. Two-thirds (66 per cent) believe the trade war will very or badly affect their province, including 68 per cent in B.C., 70 per cent in Ontario and 70 per cent in Quebec who say this. Those three provinces are

expected to be the epicentres of any job losses caused by the latest round of Trump tariffs."

There is a lot to iron out domestically in the coming days, weeks, and months, and a lot of uncertainty, fear, and frustration will need to be weathered by just about every Canadian in just about every sector as we re-calibrate our collective direction amid the disintegration of one of the most reliable international relationships we have had in our history.

By the same token, however, I am surprised one word failed to make the Angus Reid cut: Relief.

It sounds counterintuitive to say "relief" was one of the myriad feelings that coursed through my veins on Saturday morning as we waited for the Prime Minister to detail some of the factors that led to the collapse of trade talks, but it is true.

Ukraine – democracy and corruption

“Democracy cannot be held hostage by Russia,” said Mihaylo Fedorov, until recently Ukraine’s defence minister. “We must find a legal, safe and realistic mechanism which will allow Ukraine to renew its full democratic process even in the conditions of a long war.”

Seven years after the last election, some Ukrainians are demanding a new one.

The protesters who have been outside President Volodymyr Zelensky’s office on Ivan Franko Square since Fedorov was fired last month were still there the day after his nine-minute video went out on Aug. 18. However, they were not more numerous than the day before.

It has been seven years since the election that brought Zelensky to power in a landslide powered by widespread revulsion at the rampant corruption in the government. His popularity soared after the Russian invasion (90 per cent), and four-and-a-half years into the war it’s still at 65 per cent. That’s why Fedorov’s bid to mobilize the people against him has failed.

There’s a lot of dissent and dissatisfaction out there, no doubt, because the corruption problem is real. No year passes in Ukraine without arrests and trials of high-profile thieves right inside the government.

Zelensky’s chief of staff, Andriy Yermak, resigned last year amid a corruption scandal that also implicated the president’s former business partner, Timur Mindich (who fled abroad).

This year’s premier outrage featured people connected to the state-owned nuclear power company who misappropriated \$3 million to pay bail for a former energy minister accused of money laundering. They have been arrested, as have been two senior state bank officials, while the deputy head of Zelensky’s office has been fired.

Shocking, shameful stuff, but it’s Standard Operating Procedure in post-Soviet political cultures where officials and politicians act as if they have the right to plunder the state. At least in Ukraine some of them are being arrested or dismissed, and Zelensky himself seems clean.

wise. By the same logic, Winston Churchill should have called an election in 1940, when the United Kingdom was fighting the Germans all alone in the Battle of Britain, before either the Soviet Union or the United States had come into the war. The last election had been in 1935, so five years later Churchill had to hold an election or become illegitimate.

Nonsense. Parliament just passed laws each year postponing the election by one year until peace was in sight in July 1945 (one month after D-Day) – and Churchill lost. The United States did hold an election in 1944, but the situation was different: no bombs, no refugees, no enemy country within reach. (Roosevelt won, then died within three months and Truman took over).

Circumstances alter cases. Countries a long way from the front line, not being bombed, with up-to-date voter registries can certainly hold elections in wartime: New Zealand did, South Africa did, Australia held two elections, Canada had two plus a plebiscite. But it’s very hard to do it when bombs are dropping on the voters.

There could be a case for holding an election despite the nightly air raids on Ukrainian cities, the seven million citizens who have fled abroad or are living in occupied territories, and the very large number of soldiers in the trenches – but not many people in Ukraine are demanding it. Polls say that 70 per cent would prefer to wait for peace, even though seven years is a long time.

So Mihaylo Fedorov is wrong to demand an election now, although he has been badly treated by Zelensky.

He would be doubly wrong to meet Donald Trump during his forthcoming visit to the United States, because the U.S. president, after consulting with Vladimir Putin in Moscow, would be only too happy to set him up as an alternative to Zelensky.



How does Ukraine compare with other post-Soviet states on the international Corruption Perception Index? Transparency International ranks it at 104 out of 182 countries, in the same group as Brazil and Argentina – and steadily improving. Only 23 per cent of public service users paid a bribe in the previous 12 months.

Russia, by contrast, ranks 157, near the bottom of the list, in the same group as Chad and Zimbabwe. Thirty-four per cent of Russian individuals paid bribes in the past year to public officials (health, education, police, etc.), and 71 per cent of Russian companies bidding for state contracts get demands for bribes.

Ukraine is not good on the corruption front, but it’s getting better, and there’s no strong case for ‘throwing the rascals out.’ But even if most people in the government are not rascals, seven years without an election is a long time. Surely democracy demands an election now – or at least the Russians and Donald Trump think so. They claim he has no legitimacy other-



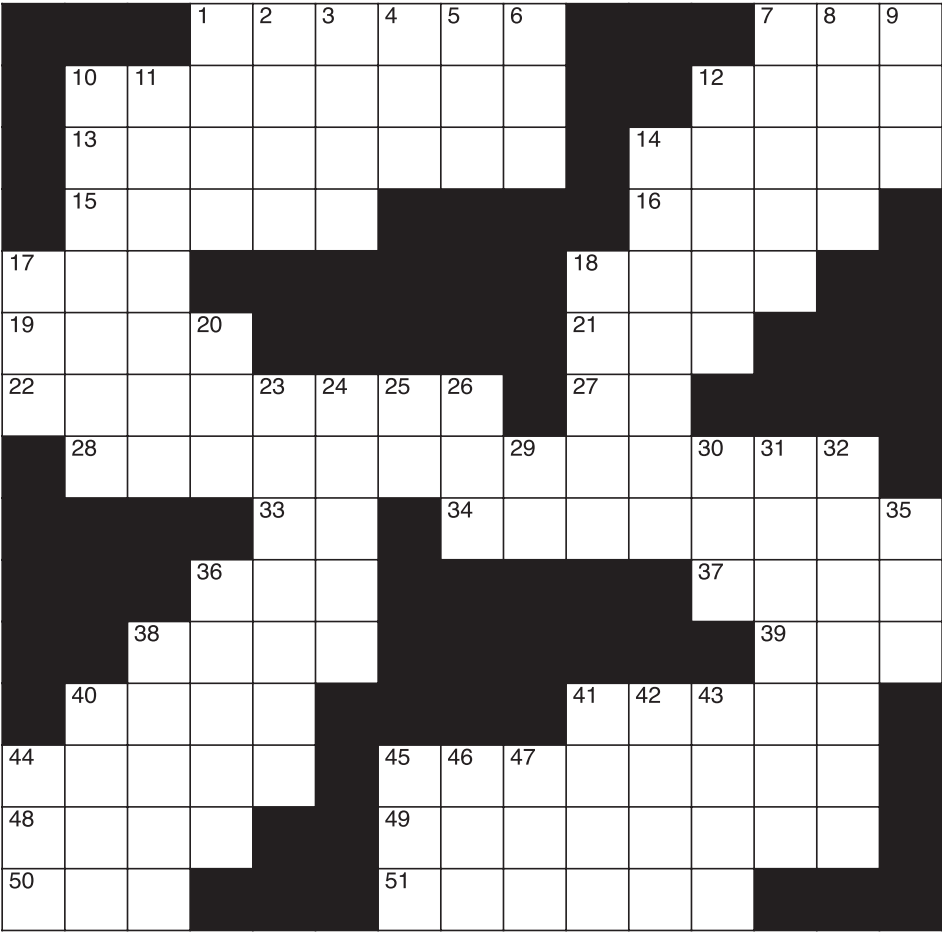

The need to declare Intimate Partner Violence an Epidemic across Ontario

What is IPV? IPV stands for Intimate Partner Violence, which refers to a range of abusive behaviours that occur in intimate relationships, including current or former spouses and dating partners. It encompasses various forms of harm, such as physical, emotional, psychological, sexual, and financial abuse, as well as stalking and harassment.

IPV is a significant global public health concern, affecting millions of people and resulting in severe health, social, and economic consequences.

Over the past several months, My Sister's Place and other organizations have been working to have municipalities declare gender based, intimate partner violence an epidemic. Municipalities across Ontario have been asked to join in solidarity in voting Intimate Partner Violence an epidemic.

This growing campaign hopes to bridge awareness and understanding within the community of the continued increasing amounts of intimate partner violence towards women and girls.

Each month, there are more women and girls killed at the hands of someone known to them. Gender based violence is the type of abuse that women, girls, 2SLG-BTQQIA+ and Indigenous people face.

The proportion of women killed by a spouse or intimate partner is over eight times greater compared to the proportion of men.

In 2025, 45 women and girls were killed by intimate partner violence in Ontario. In 2026, the statistics are heading towards another increase in the number of women and girls killed due to violence.

Simcoe County-wide, women and children continue to live in fear and face an unknown outcome as they experience intimate partner violence.

Women's shelters across our region continue to receive increased calls to our crisis

lines from women who are in desperate need of help.

At My Sister's Place alone, we receive over 1,400 calls to our crisis line annually and are stretched to keep up with the demand for our services. Our shelter is consistently struggling to house the many women and children who need to leave their abusers in south Simcoe County.

Many municipalities have taken the stand to declare Intimate Partner Violence as an Epidemic. To date, over 110 municipalities across Ontario, including New Tecumseth, Bradford West Gwillimbury, and Adjala-Tosorontio in our area, have supported and made this declaration.

An epidemic is not just about the spread of disease but is the ongoing impacts of a trend impacting a specific group.

Declaring intimate partner violence an ep-

idemic will raise awareness, reduce stigma, and potentially increase funding for emergency shelters, mental health services, and housing for victims.

The municipalities that have made this declaration so far have the collective opportunity to inform their communities of the violence women are experiencing, to educate victims that assistance is available, to voice their support and show that they are taking IPV seriously and to collaborate with the many agencies that support victims here in their communities.

Please join us in thanking Bradford, New Tecumseth and Adjala-Tosorontio for their declarations and support. By working together, we can strengthen our communities and work towards putting an end to Intimate Partner Violence.

County welcomes provincial investment of nearly \$75 million for long-term care

The County of Simcoe has issued a statement welcoming the Province of Ontario's announcement of nearly \$75 million to strengthen the long-term care workforce.

The funding highlights the importance of recruiting, training, and retaining the skilled professionals who provide care to seniors across the province.

"The quality of care our residents receive is a direct reflection of the dedicated people who work in our long-term care homes every day," said Simcoe County Warden Basil Clarke.

"Simcoe County has made significant investments in staffing, recruitment, and professional development because we know a strong workforce leads to better outcomes for residents. We welcome Ontario's continued commitment to strengthening the long-term care sector and supporting the professionals who provide compassionate, high-quality care to our seniors."

Between 2021 and 2025, staffing hours across the county's four long-term care homes increased by more than 40 per cent, resulting in approximately 200 additional positions dedicated to resident care. As a result, county homes continue to deliver exceptional care, with residents receiving an average of 4.65 hours of direct care per day across all long-term care homes in 2025 and 2026, well above provincial requirements.

Over the past few years, Long-Term Care and Senior Services has:

- Employed 464 new employees, including more than 90 nurses, while recruitment events, streamlined hiring processes, and professional development opportunities helped attract and retain talented health-care professionals.
- Enrolled 11 nurses in the Community

Commitment Program for Nurses, which provides up to \$25,000 in recruitment incentives and additional rural bonuses for eligible positions

- Registered 62 Personal Support Workers through provincial commitment funding programs
- Enrolled 11 RNs/RPNs through the new Ontario Health JOIN LTC funded initiative
- Provided up to \$3,500 per year in education incentives
- Provide higher compensation and benefits than other organizations across the long-term care sector

The county has also supported staff advancement through education and career development initiatives, helping employees grow their skills while continuing to serve residents. Additionally, the county has reduced agency staffing costs in 2026 by 77 per cent compared to 2024 by creating a stronger, more stable internal workforce.

The county takes staffing in long-term care homes very seriously and is committed to ensuring that residents' needs remain the top priority for all employees.

The county continually works to improve the quality of care across all of our homes,

including through enhanced monitoring to ensure compliance with all requirements.

Provincial recruitment and retention programs have further strengthened these efforts, helping long-term care providers connect more nurses and personal support workers with rewarding careers serving Ontario's seniors.

As demand for long-term care services continues to grow, Simcoe County remains committed to putting residents first, supporting our dedicated staff, and ensuring local seniors receive the quality care and dignity they deserve.

A man who was born and raised in Tottenham will be inducted into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame in September.

Ron Kitchener will be honoured during Country Music Week 2026 ceremonies in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan on Sept. 16-19. He will be inducted in the 2026 Stan Klees Builder category.

"Ron's impact on Canadian country music has been felt for over three decades, all through his deep belief in artists and the careers he has helped shape," says Canadian Country Music Association (CCMA) President Amy Jeninga.

"He has consistently championed talent and built opportunities where few existed, and this induction recognizes that lasting contribution. We are proud to welcome Ron into the Canadian Country Music Hall of Fame and look forward to celebrating his

legacy in Saskatoon."

As the founder of RGK Entertainment Group, Kitchener's career has spanned more than three decades as a music executive, entrepreneur and artist manager. He has guided the careers of acclaimed artists including Johnny Reid, Dean Brody, Corb Lund, Doc Walker, The Road Hammers, Time Hicks, Madeline Merlo, and Hunter Brothers.

Under Open Road Recordings, a company he founded, the label has sold millions of albums, produced 20 number-one singles, and more than 120 top 10 country radio hits.

"After producing my first campus concert, I was all in," Kitchener said of his start in the music business. "While this is a rollercoaster business, there's nothing better than when the song, the artist, and an enthusiastic live audience singing every word unite — it's magic."

Stalled Beeton development raises questions amid Flato troubles

A single model home sits at a development site in the west end of Beeton, but there has been no activity there for over a year, leaving many local residents wondering what is actually going on.

Flato Developments and several affiliated companies are facing financial and court proceedings involving residential properties across Ontario. Meanwhile, construction at its Beeton development has been stalled for more than a year.

Recently, an Ontario Superior Court judge placed several Flato-affiliated companies into receivership over more than \$29 million in outstanding loans tied to housing developments in Dundalk and Melancthon.

The situation now reaches into the Kawartha region with concerns over a huge development in Lindsay and a second lakeside property near the town of Cameron.

On Aug. 7, Flatos's lender, Cameron Stephens Mortgage Capital Ltd., a Toronto finance company that lends to housing developers, filed an application against Flato, targeting several of Flato's Lindsay companies and company president Rehmatullah himself.

A Vaughan area contractor is seeking payment as well. On August 12, Con-Drain Company registered a \$1.76-million construction lien against the main Lindsay property.

According to the lien documents, Con-Drain was contracted to perform more than \$7 million worth of work at the site, including earthmoving, water servicing and road construction, between January 2025 and early August 2026. The company says \$1.7 million remains unpaid for work completed.

For contractors and tradespeople, a construction lien is an important warning sign: it means a company working on a property claims it has not been paid and is seeking to secure that debt against the property.

The court proceedings are likely to be of particular concern to people who have put deposits on Flato's pre-construction units.

One of the biggest questions is what happens to their deposit money if the project runs into serious financial trouble.

Ontario's Tarion new-home warranty program provides protection for eligible new-home purchasers, including coverage for certain deposits if a builder fails to complete a purchase agreement.

Under Tarion's current rules, freehold home deposits are protected up to \$60,000 for homes priced below \$600,000. For homes priced at \$600,000 or more, protection is generally limited to 10 per cent of the purchase price, to a maximum of \$100,000.

Buyers should not assume, however, that protection is automatic in every circumstance.

Joint investigation leads to cocaine, fentanyl seizure: Several charges laid

A police investigation has led to drug trafficking charges against two individuals.

Members of the Nottawasaga Detachment Community Street Crime Unit, with assistance from the Dufferin CSCU of the Ontario Provincial Police, conducted a joint drug trafficking investigation that began in July 2026, with the South Simcoe Police Service Street Crime Unit.

Officers located and arrested an individual on Aug. 19, prior to executing a search warrant at a residence in Innisfil. A second individual was placed under arrest without inci-

dent.

As a result of the search, officers seized:

- 19 grams of cocaine
- 39 grams of fentanyl
- Various knives
- Three cellular devices
- \$100 in Canadian currency
- Digital scales and packaging

As a result of the investigation, the first accused, Keon Nembhard, 38, of Innisfil, has been charged with:

- Possession of a Schedule 1 Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking - Cocaine
- Possession of a Schedule 1 Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking - Fentanyl

- Traffick in a Schedule 1 Substance - Cocaine

- Traffick in a Schedule 1 Substance - Fentanyl

The second accused, Diana Singh, 27, of Innisfil, has been charged with:

- Possession of a Schedule 1 Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking - Cocaine
- Possession of a Schedule 1 Substance for the Purpose of Trafficking - Fentanyl

Both accused parties were released with a future court date at the Ontario Court of Justice in Bradford to answer to the charges.

The listed charges have not been proven in court.

Brock's Banter: Ripping off the Band-Aid

Given Trump's propensity to continually change the goal posts in any talks, no matter the benefit to his people, it was clear from the outset that Canada was going into negotiations in anything but good faith.

It was clear from the outset that we, as Canadians, would be expected to do all of the giving in this relationship, would be expected to settle for a deal that would inevitably be worse than what we've got, would be expected to settle for a deal that just one side could blow out of the water, whenever they felt like it, for whatever reason, and we would be expected to live with a deal that wasn't worth the paper it was written on.

"Our government understood, before many, that America would transform

all its commercial relationships, that it would put a series of tariffs on its closest allies, and use economic integration as a weapon," said Carney in his Saturday morning address to the nation. "That its signature was written in pencil.

"While the U.S. has imposed a seemingly endless stream of tariffs and threatened more, Canada has, by contrast, taken several steps in good faith to find compromise and secure a comprehensive deal in the best interest of Canadians and Americans. Our negotiators sought not only to reduce tariffs, but also to restore a degree of certainty and stability – through a new, comprehensive agreement that Canadian businesses and workers could rely on."

This, of course, was not to be – and

many saw the writing on the wall. While "relief" might be a strange word to use in this context, it's like a weathered Band-Aid, holding onto the remains of a wound with as much light as its adhesive allows, has finally been ripped off, we can no longer avoid what was clearly a reality, and now that we know where we stand, we can forge a new path ahead being masters of our own destiny as a nation.

It will take a lot of hard work, it will require enduring many tough days ahead, but we have the tools to build a strong economy with new partners and renewed relationships rather than hitching our economic wagon to a horse more than willing to kick us in the teeth whenever it's feeling the proverbial zoomies.

And, if there is any doubt that this would – and would always be – the case, one only has to look to missives sent out by the White House musing upon changing the name of Lake Ontario because they didn't get the deal they wanted. It was never about making a serious deal.

Those devilish details of what ultimately led to the collapse of trade talks are yet to be released in full. Conservative leader Pierre Poilievre is calling for a special Parliamentary session to get those details released to the public – and rightly so – but, if reports stating the United States wanted control over our foreign and trade policies to ink the deal, effectively annexing our nation, are true, that's really all we need to know.

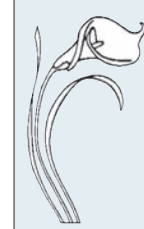

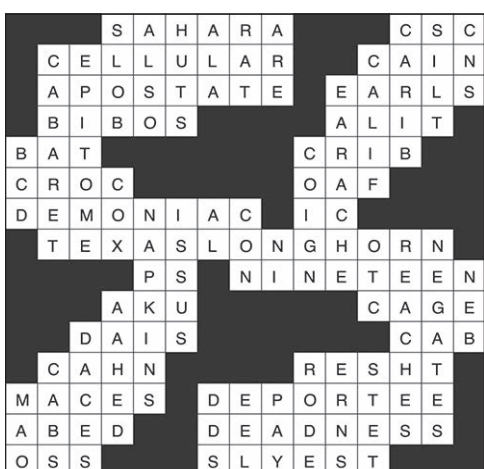
